May Seal Disused Pill-boxes

Disused concrete pill-boxes in the vicinity of Ngamotu Beach, New Plymouth, are to be inspected by members of the New Plymouth City Council with a view to sealing them off completely.

Built for home guard purposes during the Second World War, the concrete structures have proved a popular playground for children but a possibly dangerous one.

One of the structures near the eastern end of the beach and on beach level, has had its two main entrances sealed but the look-out opening remains.

The opening is just large enough for a child to clamber through and the floor of the box is just deep enough to prevent children climbing out again without assistance.

Another of the boxes not far from the Pioneer Road railway crossing, is completely open.

Cannot Give Undertaking To Students

Whatever agreement there was between the New Zealand University Students' Association and the secretariat of the international student conference, there could be no Government undertaking to allow into the country all who wished to attend the Christchurch conference, the Prime Minister, Mr. K. J. Holyoake, said yesterday.

The Government departments concerned had given an assurance that sympathetic consideration would be given to all accredited delegates for whom visas were sought, Mr. Holyoake said.

He had been asked to comment on a report that New Zealand delegates to the conference had been instructed to try to expedite the admittance of four delegates from the International Union of Students with headquarters at Prague.

"The number of countries and organisations represented at the conference is clear evidence of the Government's goodwill in the matter," Mr. Holyoake said.
