


"JUMBO," Mr. Hooker's most treasured animal, which was reputed to be the strongest horse for his size in New Zealand.

Interesting Facts from Pages of Our History

- 1854 Mr. J. F. Hooker was born in New Plymouth on October 20th.
- 1868 Left school to work in a flax mill at Te Namu, near Opunake.
- 1869 Became a bullock driver.
- 1871 Mr. Hooker purchased an express and two horses with his savings. It was in this year that Mr. Hooker became a general carrier.
- 1890 Built sample rooms and office—a modern building of five rooms on the corner of King and Egmont Streets.

- 1914 Retired and handed the business over to his sons, Fred, Gordon, Royce and Edgar. At this stage Mr. Hooker owned four expresses and eight horses.
- 1916 The firm purchased its first motor truck.
- 1928 Built their present fine premises on same site as old premises erected in 1890.
- 1928 Inauguration of New Plymouth-Hawera and intermediate towns daily goods transport service. Purchased premises in Hawera and established a branch.
- 1936 The last horse was replaced with a motor truck.
- 1952 Completed 81 years of continuous transport activity, with a present fleet of 16 lorries and a staff of 26.
