The Ruck'n'Maul is the brainchild of former Taranaki rugby players Peter Harold and Bryce McEldowney, local racing identity John Wheeler, school principal Les Osten and former bank manager Ian Burrell.

Team captain Harold took full credit for the idea of the bar, which opens on

July 21.
"The whole rugby thing was my idea and, month after month after month, more and more people got interested." Something of a loosehead when it

came to the bar's game plan, Harold not only came up with its quirky title, but also the distinctive design for its frontage. A huge Taranaki rugby jersey is splashed across the front of the
