

# Names Unveiled At Inglewood Ceremony

The names of 55 men of the Inglewood district who fell in the Second World War were unveiled at the Anzac Day service at Inglewood's cenotaph yesterday morning. There was a large attendance of the public, and the ceremony was held in fine weather, drenching rain falling just as the service had ended with a march-past of returned servicemen.

Inglewood churches held their own special services, the congregations dispersing at 11.30 a.m. At that hour members of the Inglewood sub-branch of the New Plymouth Returned Services Association paraded at the town hall and, led by the Inglewood municipal band, marched to the cenotaph, where the Anzac service was held.

The mayor, Mr. R. W. Brown, presided, and addresses were given by the Rev. A. J. Wardlaw and the president of the Inglewood R.S.A., Mr. S. W. Askew. The Rev. H. Ashworth, Captain A. Jones, of the Salvation Army, and the Rev. F. Oulds also took part in the service. After prayers of dedication, the memorial, with the 55 names added to those of the 1914-18 war, was unveiled by Mr. A. N. Franklyn, whose only two sons were lost in the Second World War. The Last Post was sounded by Buglers J. R. Maxwell, R. Spurdle, and L. Beisiek, and the band played "Garland of Flowers."

Wreaths were placed at the foot of the Cenotaph, alongside others laid earlier in the morning by private individuals and representatives of several organisations.
